Modellvergleich

Kriterium	Logistische Regression	Decision Tree
Interpretierbarkeit	hoch	mittel
Overfitting-Gefahr	gering	hoch
Skalierung	noetig ja	nein
Didaktisch	sinnvoll sehr	ja

Fazit: Bei kleinen, sauberen Datensatzen ist die Logistische Regression meist stabiler. Decision Trees sind anschaulich, aber uebermotiviert - sie merken sich gern alles.

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
